

## Course Selection Process

- 8<sup>th</sup> grade teachers will be making recommendations for levels in your academic areas (English, Social Studies, Science, Math and World Language, if applicable). These recommendations are based on data such as benchmarks, grades, NWEA and SBAC scores.
- Using the recommendations, you will be asked to enter your course requests and alternatives into PowerSchool with your parent/guardian.
- THS and TMS counselors will meet with you in groups to review what you entered.

#### Course Selection Process cont.

• Your course requests will be sent home for your parent/guardian to review again.




- You will meet with Mrs. Miller to talk about transitioning to THS. You can join a pathway at this time.
- The high school schedule will be created. Alternatives will be used to complete schedules that have conflicts.
- You will receive your schedule late in August prior to the start of school.



# How to Read the Course Catalog (page 9, top left)



This project-based course introduces students to the ever-changing field of business with a focus on economics, entrepreneurship, personal finance, and marketing. Students will have the opportunity to explore leadership styles, apply the economic decision-making process, practice public speaking and soft skill development, learn financial literacy concepts, and create and develop a marketing plan. In class, students engage with their peers to actively practice the 21st century skills of communication, collaboration, creativity, and critical thinking through a variety of engaging and interactive assignments. Key activities in this course require students to: design infographics and advertisements, participate in the CT Stock Market game to research and analyze corporations, investigate entrepreneurial, nonprofit, and social enterprise organizations, and more. Team building, project management, current events and the CT Stock Market Game are integrated throughout the course.

#### How do I know which class to take in each area?

Bagle Block	All students are randomly assigned to an Bagle Block.
Health/ PE 9	All students are signed up for this/no recommendations made.
English 1	All students will take the class, however, may take it at different levels.  Students will be recommended for non levelled (NL), college preparatory (CP) or honors (H).
World History	All students will take the class, however, may take it at different levels.  Students will be recommended for NL, CP or H.
Integrated	All students will take the class, however, may take it at different levels.
Science	Students will be recommended for NL, CPfor H.
Math	Many students will take 2 math classes in grade 9.  For most students, the sequence will follow
	Students in Math 8 - will take TWO math classes next year, Algebra 1(A) and 1(B), recommendation will be made for NL or CP- students will take
	both classes
	Students currently in Algebra 1A - will take Algebra 1(B), some students will also be recommended for H Geometry or CP Geometry.
	Students in Algebra IAB – will take ONE math course in grade 9 -
	Geometry, recommendation will be made for CP or H

Many students will take a **World Language** in grade 9. Some students will wait until grade 10. For those students who have started a language at TMS, they should continue to take a language at TMS.

Prenoh 2/Spanish 2	Students who are currently enrolled in either Prench AB or Spanish AB and have an average above 80 will take Prench or Spanish 2; this may change with teacher recommendation
Prench 1/ Spariish 1	Students who have not taken Prench or Spanish at TMS may choose to begin a language at THS.  Some students who took Prench AB or Spanish AB may be recommended to take Prench 1 or Spanish 1 at THS.
Preliminary Spanish	This is an introductory Spanish course which may stand alone as a student's world language requirement or be used as a steppingstone to the Spanish sequence of courses.



#### Electives

Electives are courses that you are not required to take. Electives falfill graduation requirements. Choosing electives should be based on YOUR INTERESTS and areas you want to explore. You should NOT choose them based on what your friends are doing, the high school offers multiple sections of courses and although you make similar selections, it does not mean you will have the same schedule.

ALL students will choose 3 electives and 3 alternative electives.

## Mrs. Kirwin UConn Popular Music and Diversity in American Society

- College Level Course
